

SOCIOECONOMIC PROFILE OF VERDUN AND TE MEMBERS



Located in the Wellington-De L'Église sector of Verdun, Toujours ensemble meets the varied needs of a particularly underprivileged clientele in Greater Montreal that experiences a high degree of social, academic, family and cultural problems.

SNAPSHOT OF THE TERRITORY *

Stable population: 66,160 people live in the borough

A borough made up of three sectors with high sociodemographic contrasts:

• The Wellington-De L'Église sector is known particularly for the vulnerability of its residents

Low incomes are more common in Wellington-De L'Église than Verdun as a whole, especially among youth:

- 25% of people in Verdun and Montreal have a low income, whereas this rate reaches 32% in Wellington-De L'Église
- Among people under 18, the percentage rises to 41% in Wellington-De L'Église and 31% in Verdun, compared to 28% in Montreal

Single parents are very common across Verdun, particularly in the Wellington-De L'Église sector:

• 39% of families with children in Verdun and 46% in the Wellington sector are single parent families (33% for the Island of Montreal). Wellington-De L'Église has one of the highest rates of single parents on the Island of Montreal

SOME FACTS:

- **Youth (0 to 14 years): 13.5%** (15.2% on the Island of Montreal)
- Families with children: 55.1% (62.8% on the Island of Montreal)
- Immigrants: 22.5% (33.2% on the Island of Montreal)
- New immigrants: 8 % (8,3 % on the Island of Montreal)
- People 15 and older without a diploma or degree (low education level): 17.9% (18.9% on the Island of Montreal)

SNAPSHOT OF Te

OUR PARTICIPANTS:

- 31% of our youth don't speak French at home

PORTRAIT OF

Toujours ensemble is a community organization that has been in Verdun since 1986. In addition to supporting its regular members,* each year Te provides direct assistance to Verdun youth and their families, which represents near 1,000 people.

Regular member: youths aged 9 to 17 enrolled in Te during the current school year.

Parcours Program



GENERAL OBJECTIVES

- 1 Contribute to the academic perseverance and success of youth
- Help improve the living environment of these young people and their families
- Work to improve social and economic factors for both them and their families

The Parcours Program offers a variety of activities that focus on discovery, cooperation, and personal excellence to contribute to young people's personal, social and educational development.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The Parcours Program has a rich and diverse monthly program that helps young people develop their social skills and aptitudes. The team helps each student in the program reach their full potential and encourages them to be active in their communities.

- 7,058: Number of times young people attended our regular afternoon activities during the year, this represents an average of 57 youths per day
- Sports, cooking, science, art, outings in the city, outdoor games and theme days are just a sample of the
 many workshops that Te runs. On average, 17 young people participate in these activities every day
- In addition to its regular activities, Te organized 8 low-cost outings during the school year that 62 youths
 took full advantage of these opportunities.

To meet its set goals, the team organized more short-term projects (travel, drama, game club; the gala; a running club, etc.) to help young people develop a sense of commitment and experience success. For our annual trip, 10 youths went on an expedition to St. John's (Newfoundland and Labrador). The trip included an outdoor excursion of a few days on the famous East Coast Trail. This rewarding experience indeed broadened the group's horizons.







SCHOOL LUNCHES

The school lunch service provides balanced and nutritious meals to primary students at the École Lévis-Sauvé and the École Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes in the Commission scolaire Marguerite-Bourgeoys. For about one dollar per meal, young people from low-income families can eat right in a welcoming, structured and safe environment. This service fills an essential need and helps students stay focused when they go back to class. After lunch, the kids join organized activities (such as reading, art or supervised games) to develop different skills and socialize with children their own age.

During the school year, 7,889 meals were served to 56 youths.

HOMEWORK ASSISTANCE

A homework assistance service is provided every day to contribute to the academic perseverance of our youth.

- On average, 15 students get help in the homework assistance room every day
- They have access to 10 computers
- They can access a library with over 2,100 references.

Toujours ensemble provides a calm and inviting homework space along with the required materials, books and technology. For the team, the homework assistance program lets them help and guide parents and their children through the academic journey, which can be very demanding.





SUMMER PROGRAM

Te definitely gets buzzing with activity over the summer, when the team spends some fun time with the students they worked with during the year in a different context. Summer is also a time for them to meet new faces.

The summer program is a strong combination of three projects: the day camp (for children aged 8 to 12) and Trip Ados (for teens aged 13 to 17), which offer affordable camps, as well as Animation jeunesse (for children 8 to 12 years), which runs free activities.

- 142 youths took part in our summer programming
- 68 children registered in the day camp
- 17 teens participated in the Trip Ados camp
- 57 youths had fun in public parks and spaces with the Animation jeunesse team.

During the summer, Te and its staff use humour and know-how to provide these services to youths and their parents. These young people get to enjoy original and fun activities while becoming involved as volunteers in their neighbourhoods. For parents, this is a chance to get some rest while knowing their children are in good hands.









Passeport pour ma réussite Program

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

Maintain a range of diverse activities by emphasizing discovery, cooperation and the overcoming of personal limitations

Develop more short-term projects to encourage academic perseverance and cultivate success

Toujours ensemble has run the Passeport pour ma réussite Program in partnership with Pathways to Education Canada, Passeport Québec, and the Verdun community since 2007. Based on a global approach, this program combines the family, school and community to help young people develop and to support them in their academic and personal journeys. This program has made a difference and stood out through its four areas of mentoring, academic, social and financial support.

In 2015-2016, 210 youths benefited from this program.

MENTORING SUPPORT

Each of our Student Parent Support Workers (SPSW) meet with about 40 youths at least once a month to provide mentoring support.

- Evaluate needs and implement an action plan
- · Focus on motivation, independence and accountability
- Act as a liaison to ensure cooperation between the family, school and community.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT (TUTORING)

According to the needs identified by the SPSW, students receive academic support during two mandatory periods per week. This support is available thanks to over 80 dedicated volunteers as well as former members of the program.

- Assistance with assignments, homework and exam preparation
- 32 weeks of activity, 12 sessions per week.

SOCIAL SUPPORT (MENTORING)

Three forms of social support as part of a continuum of services provided for 21 hours per week:

- The goal of group mentoring (for students in Secondary 1 to 3) is to help young people develop social skills and self-esteem through cooking, sports, bike repair, art and other workshops
- Specialized mentoring (for students in Secondary 4 and 5) helps students develop skills and interests through projects that get them involved in the community and help them fulfil their potential
- Career mentoring and guidance counselling (for students in Secondary 4 and 5) to prepare students for the job market and help them explore their career and academic options.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

This support aims to improve academic perseverance and access to postsecondary education by reducing financial obstacles.

- Financial contribution to cover the cost of uniforms, school supplies and educational materials
- Food assistance (tokens or meal cards for the school cafeteria)
- Opportunity to accumulate \$400, and up to a maximum of \$2,000, in bursaries per year of participation in the program.

PROGRAM IMPACTS

Thus far, **131 students in four cohorts** have completed the program. Furthermore, 28 of our students will receive their high school diploma this year. Out of this number, 23 students received help to enroll in CEGEP and 2 are getting ready to start vocational training.

All program goals were reached this year. To keep in contact with our young people during the summer, we organized about 35 activities, such as yoga, collective gardens, bike workshops and outings, which students attended 118 times. Other activities such as an information night, a collective cooking workshop, and a spaghetti dinner also helped families develop a sense of belonging and feel involved in their child's journey. We have continued our partnership with the École secondaire Monseigneur-Richard, and our teams attend multidisciplinary meetings at the school and stay in constant communication with the school team.







Sac à dos is an academic perseverance program for primary students. Its educational activities are structured so as to provide personalized intervention for each child. This year, Sac à dos officially became a permanent part of Toujours ensemble's programming.



FACTS ABOUT SAC À DOS

44 STUDENTS:

13 FROM THE ÉCOLE CHANOINE-JOSEPH-THÉORÊT AND 31 FROM THE ÉCOLE LÉVIS-SAUVÉ

2 VOLUNTEERS

33 WEEKS OF ACTIVITIES

Most of these students are in Grade 3 to Grade 6 and are 8-14 years of age. They have various educational needs (learning problems, behaviour problems), personal needs (social skills, organization, work methods) and social needs (family problems, need for integration, and other obstacles). The students were identified by their teachers and the school administration.

Students at the École primaire Chanoine-Joseph-Théorêt participated in the program activities once a week, whereas students at the École Lévis-Sauvé participated twice a week.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

During the homework assistance period, students learn about effective work methods, such as independent study, planning, organization, time management and study strategies. The groups have a small ratio of a maximum of five students for each youth worker.

READING

The goal of this activity is to help students develop an interest in reading. This time is divided between periods of staff-led reading activities group reading activities and individual reading time. This year, the team worked with the Verdun library to develop special activities for the Pigûre lecture series. We also developed a relationship with the daycare service at the École Lévis-Sauvé, as students in the Sac à dos Program showed and read books to preschool children registered at the daycare. Finally, an event with a Verdun-based comic book artist and author was organized during the Hooked on School Days.

FUN AND EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOPS

These workshops develop social skills such as communication, conflict resolution, collaboration, self-esteem, and more. The varied programming alternates between simple workshops and multi-week projects.

FAMILY ACTIVITIES

This year, we developed a component for parents and presented two workshops on homework time at home and reading. At the family picnic in May 2016, students gave a percussion performance that they rehearsed with the father of one of the students in the program.

INTERVENTION

Our team has two youth workers and one coordinator. Our intervention approach is tailored to the needs of each youth and is based on collaboration between the school, family and community. Our workers therefore act as a channel for constant communication between parents and teachers. Action plans are developed based on an analysis of each student's difficulties in order to focus their energy and motivate them to work on specific goals.

EVALUATION

Our team has developed custom tools to analyze the impact of our work on students' reading ability, social skills and motivation. The results of the 2015-2016 cohort will be available in our final report produced in June.

IMPACT

For the cohort of 27 students who finished in June 2015, 16 were in Grade 6. **Out of this number:**

- 12 went on to take normal Secondary 1 classes and 3 were placed in high school adaptation classes
- Amongst these 15 youths, 14 have registered for the Passeport pour ma réussite Program
- 1 student had to repeat Grade 6.





VOLUNTEER INVOLVEMENT

In addition to providing invaluable help and support for the team, volunteers are above all people who choose to make a difference in their communities. This commitment can take many forms, but no matter how they get involved, volunteers do so out of a passion and desire to make a positive impact. Volunteers are agents of social change whose involvement has an impact on all of society. At Toujours ensemble, over 150 people are actively involved with young people, and their contribution is essential!

NATIONAL VOLUNTEER WEEK

For National Volunteer Week from April 13 to 17, 2015, Toujours ensemble recognized the commitment of its volunteers and encouraged people from the community to get involved with youth. A recognition event was held at Te's offices so that employees could personally thank the nearly one hundred volunteers who are actively involved with the organization.

Te GALA

Our organization's year-end gala was held in the auditorium of the École secondaire Monseigneur-Richard on May 29, 2015. This variety show featured the talents of about 15 students, who performed for an excited room of family and friends. This event was also a chance to acknowledge the students who stood out the most during the school year through their work and effort. Overall, 27 youths received a certificate attesting to their involvement, perseverance, positive attitude and team spirit. Families, volunteers and partners were also invited to the pre-gala reception. Ms. Mélanie Boucher, Executive Director of Fondation Québec Jeunes, took this opportunity to present a donation of \$10,000 for the activities of the Parcours Program.

TRIATHLON DE VERDUN

Three employees from Te—Maxime, Chloé and Christine—took part in the Triathlon de Verdun on August 9, 2015. Through this event, they honoured the youth in our programs while raising funds for our organization and raised nearly **\$600**. Many thanks to everyone for your support and contribution!

"GRADUATION" CELEBRATION

Toujours ensemble's "Brunch des finissants" was held on Saturday, June 6, 2015, in the council room at the Verdun borough hall. The Parcours and Passeport pour ma réussite programs celebrated the academic success of 45 students. Three youths in the Parcours Program received a bursary in honour of their academic achievement. Parents, volunteers, the mayor, elected city officials, commissioners, our Passeport Québec partner, and Te staff came together to celebrate the academic perseverance of the students who completed our program.

BACK-TO-SCHOOL PARTY AND OPEN HOUSE

On September 18, Te threw a back-to-school party with different activities, such as a scavenger hunt at both of Te's centres to let people discover our services along with a corn roast and activities in Willibrord Park. About **100** people took part in this great celebration to kick off our organization's regular activities and our new Sac à dos Program.

WINE AND CHEESE

On October 29, 2015, about 100 partners, donors and volunteers from the past year attended this big celebration at Te's offices. During the event, Toujours ensemble handed out its award for an exceptional contribution of an individual or partner. This year's award went to the École Lévis-Sauvé for all of the incredible work it has done for many years through the school lunch service and, more recently, the new Sac à dos Program. We also took this opportunity to introduce Te's new website and online donation platform. Warmest thanks to Coutu communications for their exceptional work and generous donation of time worth \$21,900.



CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

Thanks to our generous donors and partners, Te raised **\$39,500** (excluding the value of donated goods), which means that **900** people enjoyed the holidays as they are meant to be enjoyed!

- 200 families received a Christmas basket with vegetables and meat.
- Through the generosity of Ms. Carolyn Hayes Renaud, grocery gift cards were also given out to these families.
- Thanks to The Gazette Christmas Fund, **24** families received a cheque of **\$125**, and **40** children received a gift from The Gazette employees.
- **36** families sponsored by Te received a basket of food and personalized gifts. A special thanks to Raymond Chabot Grant Thorton and Citoyenneté et Immigration Canada employees for their generous contribution.
- **100** youths who attend our school lunch service and the Parcours Program received gifts from clients of the Mémé Tartine artisanal bakery.

With the theme of "Mr. Jack's Bizarre Christmas," Te's traditional Christmas supper was held in our offices on December 11, 2015, for **101** people. This enchanted evening was filled with dancing and surprises. Thank you to all of our event sponsors.

The many activities organized included a meeting with author and artist Jacques Goldstyn, who is known for his illustrations in *Les Débrouillards* magazine. Thanks to all of our superheroes for your encouragement, perseverance and determination. GOVERNANCE AND COMMUNITY AND DEMOCRATIC LIFE

Founded in Westmount in 1979 through a citizen-based initiative, Toujours ensemble is an independent community organization that is registered as a charity with the Canada Revenue Agency. Its existence is intimately linked to the well-being of the community and particularly that of youth.

For over 35 years, Te has helped Verdun youth become accomplished adults who are active in their communities and has equipped them to deal with whatever they may face in life. We create our activities based on the interests and needs of these youth. Te also provides volunteer opportunities for community residents, and our Board of Directors is made up of 10 to 12 independent volunteer members from the public network and government bodies.

Our Board members, who are elected at the annual general meeting for a period of two years, come from different professional areas and care about the success of young people. Many of them live in the borough of Verdun. Together, they uphold the organization's interests and financial stability and oversee its strategic development. They generally meet six times a year.

In addition to sitting on the Board, the members are also invited to join at least one working committee: governance, finance, development, human resources and programs. The mandate of these five committees is to support Te's senior administrators with the management of day-to-day operations.

In addition to our community involvement through local roundtables and associations, we work with other neighbourhood organizations to constantly

provide better services. As we are aware of the needs of the community, we have broadened our mission to provide food assistance to families in need during the holidays.

The Te team provides guidance not only to young people but also to their families. We invite parents to join different family activities and to share their comments and suggestions. Last year, Te created a Parents Committee to encourage parents to get involved and to develop a sense of belonging with the organization (see Committees, p. 21).

Every year, Te organizes an open house so that people in the community can come meet our team.

The Board of Directors created working committees responsible for specific areas. Each Board member must sit on at least one committee per year.

E FINANCE COMMITTE

The goal of the Finance Committee is to advise the Board on financial matters, financial planning, investments, funding and the audit process. It also ensures that the necessary mechanisms are in place to protect the organization's assets.

In 2015-2016, the committee reviewed all financial tools to facilitate budget and cash flow tracking.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Development Committee's goal is to help the organization innovate in its approach and achieve its fundraising goals. These fundraising campaigns focus on companies, foundations and individuals who support the organization's mission.

In 2015-2016, the "Identity" and "Development" committees were merged into the Development Committee so that everyone could work together to ensure the organization's future and present a stronger image. Last year, we created a new website and a new online donation platform. We also prepared a development plan to provide an efficient framework to search for funding opportunities. A number of fundraising tools, such as the "adopt a student" campaign, were implemented through this plan.

HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE

The aim of the Human Resources Committee is to ensure that the workplace and working conditions are conducive to employee well-being. The committee also works to improve human resources management and clarify our administrative policies and procedures.

In 2015-2016, the committee mainly focused on creating a new salary structure and reviewing the employee handbook. Other projects will continue in 2016-2017, such as the implementation of a training plan and the review of the performance evaluation process.

CONTRACT COMMITTEE

The mandate of the Governance Committee is to ensure that the organization fulfils its requirements in terms of healthy governance and sees to the application of revisions to the general by-laws, if required.

In 2015-2016, the committee conducted a preliminary review of the organization's general by-laws; however, due to tight deadlines, these could not be tabled at the annual general meeting. However, this review will be finalized in 2016-2017.

PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

The mandate of this new committee is to ensure consistency between our different programs and enhance our evaluation processes. About a dozen meetings were held this year with staff members, members of the Board of Directors, and senior management. This team has addressed different topics, such as volunteering, evaluation, intraprogram transitions, and parent involvement. Since April, a series of initiatives was started in these areas. The year has definitely gotten off to a great—and busy—start!

In addition to these Board committees, Te created two others:

C GREEN COMMITTEE

The mandate of this committee is to improve our practices based on sustainability principles while analyzing new opportunities for action. We are at the preliminary stage of conducting an environmental diagnostic so that we can clearly define our initial green actions.

PARENTS COMMITTEE

For its first phase, this committee's mandate was to increase the involvement of parents in the Passeport pour ma réussite Program and enhance their sense of belonging. Since its creation, the Parents Committee has held nine meetings and three discussion workshops on different topics: the transition from primary to secondary school, the keys to success, and support for teens. The committee members are currently conducting a reflection process. Next year, the team is looking to open the door to the parents of students in other programs and to organize new activities for them.
